- **Apologies:** Eric & Irene.
- **Forthcoming events:** participation in the Silsoe Flower Festival will not take place as we have been unable to contact the Festival representative for further information. Other events in hand, help with the School Fair would be appreciated (*see report elsewhere*).

The 'who's doing what' sheet for the July tournament will be put up in the pavilion. There are 28 entries so far, and we should book space at the Star & Garter for meals as soon as possible.

- **National and federation competitions:** see results on these pages. Other matches taking place at Wrest Park in the near future are Colworth's league match against Letchworth on 14 July and their Longman Cup match on July 30.
- **Coaching Day:** reported on in last newsletter. We are hoping to organise some doubles games (a pro-am alternate stroke format was suggested) on July 18 as a form of coaching for higher handicappers. (*A form was put up in the pavilion but only attracted two couples, so nothing took place*)
- **Groundsmanship:** Eric suggested the need for summer fertiliser, of which we have a supply of a soluble variety. The supply of clips is getting low and some old metal clips are to be repainted to fill the gap. (*More clips have been bought, and fertiliser was applied on 14 July*).
- **40th anniversary event:** The date for this is planned to be Saturday 22 September. A list of potential invitees should be ready by the end of July. We hope to use the facilities at the Institute and consult with them regarding catering. A figure of £5 per head was suggested, with a cash bar
- **Club constitution:** George and Eric have been looking at amendments to the original constitution which reflect the current status of the club and its relationship with the Institute. This will continue with the intention of presenting the new constitution at next year's AGM

All over in about 30 seconds - pathetic, really.

Silsoe School Fair - 30 June

Once again we invited adults and children to have a go at some typical croquet shots at the school's annual event. Billed as the Silsoe Croquet Club (!) we arrived to find our original pitch had been changed, and we then changed it again to get some better ground. John Wheeler set to to mow the 100 square yards (two cuts required, with an interruption for showers), and John Bevington set up the events. Four attempts at a tournament hoop from a yard, followed by four attempts at a five yard roquet (with suitable allowances for children, who had to make do with full size mallets).

The uneven nature of the ground made it a sporting course, and balls could take off or make sudden deviations without warning. This was followed by four attempts at a short rush into a four foot diameter circle, and finally four split croquet strokes to get each ball into a circle. A pronounced hill made it necessary to aim for the left hand edge of the left hand circle in order to stand any chance at all.

John Martin also came to help, and we raised about £20. As for next year, well, we could do with some child-sized mallets. And I think the circles could be bigger - after innumerable attempts I only managed to get both balls in the circles once!
