Ben Ashwell wins the All England Handicap

Ben Ashwell, whose triumph in the All England area final was described in the last issue, went to the national final at Roehampton on 15/16 September and completed a memorable year by carrying off the Trevor Williams Cup and New Zealand Tray. Ben joins previous Wrest Park winners Mike Wilson (1980) and Robert England (1986).

The event was managed by Douglas Gurney, who used a 'quality of wins' (i.e. who you'd beaten) rating for the lesser places, and the 1-2-3 was:

Ben won the game between himself and Martin, and Victor, one of several on four wins, was the only player to beat Ben.

The All England was initiated in 1923 through the energy and enthusiasm of Col. H.J.Whittle (an early CA reformer), based on the ideas of G.C.Bromthwaite and the Rev W.J.Limmer Sheppard (two North country players) to encourage croquet in places outside London and the Home Counties. It was initially and colloquially known as 'The Grand National' and remains the biggest handicap tournament in terms of entry.

An added bonus was that Ben's impeccable timing allowed us to have the trophies on display as part of the club's 40th anniversary celebrations. We should also thank Douglas Gurney's wife, a jeweller, who took one

look at the state of the New Zealand Tray and promptly took it away to be cleaned in time for the presentation.

Another change to the team was required as Eric was attending a conference in Rumania, so old campaigner Bryan Harral kindly stepped in, having first had to renew his CA membership. Bryan is one of the Wrest Park veterans, having won tournaments in the late 70s and been a member of the Bedfordshire Inter Counties team, but it was hard to have to make your first appearance in the final, on unfamiliar lawns and (more importantly) playing with Barlow GT balls instead of our usual Jaques Eclipse.

To our surprise we went into lunch 2-1 ahead. George came good, and after Mike missed the pegout John W hit in and John B finished for the narrowest of wins. In the afternoon singles George produced one of his special moments when, having had one ball pegged out and with the opponent laid up in corner 4 with a rush to 4 -back, he ran penultimate hard from a distance. The ball negotiated the peg and continued through rover, stopping just clear of the hoop. George called for a referee, and, from an awkward position, shot and hit. This left the match tied at 3-3, and all depending on John B's game with Ken.

John seemed to have things under control when he over-rolled on the approach to rover, and, being prevented by hoop 1 from getting back close to partner, lost all powers of logical thought in the frustration of the moment and tried to go for a wired but runnable position. Ken hit the half-ball on offer and went to the peg, pegging John out, and when the long lift was missed (everyone apparently silently screaming for the short shot) Ken did an immaculate stop shot approach from corner 4 to make 3-back and went round to win. *Sic transit Maria Rosa.*

Some of us who had stayed overnight returned to the club the next day to watch the Inter Club final, which rather put our own efforts into perspective. Cheltenham, in the final for the third consecutive year, were playing Surbiton. In the doubles the Surbiton pair of Stephen Mulliner and world champion Reg Bamford won +26 with a Bamford triple peel in the eighth turn. Mulliner then won his singles +26 with a triple of his own, while at the same time and on the same lawn Bamford completed an immaculate sextuple peel to win by the same score. This was concluded with a rover peel where the peeled ball was only sent through by a small amount, the other ball deliberately being left short. Reg then played a jump shot, the ball erupting from the ground like a low trajectory shell to sail clean through to the south boundary where another ball was waiting. Neither of their opponents took croquet. As Jeremy Dyer had beaten Don Gaunt +23 with yet another triple peel the match was over in a mere two hours.

Handicap tournament

14-16 September

Sixteen players met on Friday 14th September in the magnificent Wrest Park Gardens for the three day September Tournament. This despite a forecast promising a cold wind and blustery showers. In the event, the weather was kind; although there was a fresh wind from the North, there was a lot of sun and no rain during play, although George Collin did get wet while mowing the lawns on Friday evening.

The Tournament was run as an Egyptian, with no time limits on any of the games before the last afternoon. Despite this, a total of 55 games were played during the weekend. Tom Anderson showed how much he enjoys the game. Not content with five and a half hours for his first match on Friday, his first on Saturday only finished when his opponent pegged out at five to four in the afternoon. This was after a short interruption while a referee had to adjudicate on the correct position for a clip found in a pocket some time after the last time that ball had been played. Despite these efforts, he still managed to finish six games by Sunday evening

(though, with twilight looming, a time limit was imposed on the last one).

Perhaps the most memorable shot was by Don Cornelius. After Don had failed to peg out one of his balls, his opponent, John Bevington was making steady progress until he jammed his backward ball in Rover. Don then proceeded to peel him with a shot from Corner 3, and finish the game.

The overall winner of the Tournament was Dennis Graham, who won all six of his games, including a nail-biting last one against John Bee; Dennis ran out the winner, plus two on time. George Collin was runner-up. John Bee did have the satisfaction of achieving his bronze award during the Tournament.

The tournament was managed with unfailing good humour by Cliff Jones, helped by various members of his family. As well as thanks from all those competing, he also received the traditional Wrest Park award of the Golden Bananas, as the winner of the fewest games. Wrest Park provided their usual excellent hospitality, and made all feel welcome. All the comments heard afterwards were of how enjoyable it had been, and how much all were looking forward to coming back next season.

All England Golf Croquet Final 22/23 September

In contrast to the goings-on in the Old Dairy, the catering arrangements for this event were rather more makeshift. Manager Brian Judson, in spite of having reminded players to bring their own lunch on Saturday, found several had come without and was forced into going to the village shop and buying up a quantity of sandwiches and a loaf of bread and pieces of cheese. On the following day we had promised to go to Tesco in Flitwick to buy sandwiches for anyone who wanted them, but when John Bevington got there the shelves were empty, so he had to buy the necessary bits and make them up in the pavilion.

The event seemed to go off very well, even though there had been some last-minute problems with players who didn't appear to have had their handicaps established until the last minute. Styles of play varied between the traditional close-quarters manoeuvring and the more modern aggressive shoot-out in which balls are knocked out of the way from almost any distance.

The winner was Marcus Evans from Nailsea, who beat John Moore from Tyneside in the deciding match on Sunday morning. One hopes that the CA, if they want to encourage this event, can come up with a more substantial trophy in the future.

After sending Brian some photos for his report I received a reply in which he said: *"May I take this opportunity to thank you and other members of your club for all the background work you did - getting the lawns ready, setting the hoops, providing drinks and light refreshment throughout the weekend. It was very much appreciated by all of us. This plus the lovely setting and the fine weather contributed to a really enjoyable weekend and many players commented to this effect."*

Solid geometry - the 14 point polyhedron

A chance discussion between Rod Ashwell and George Collin on suitable trophies for a 14 point tournament led to George's turning up to the S&G with a collection of solid shapes and wire frames with 14 vertices; Rod arriving later with more information culled from the Internet. The basic model is a cube with a pyramid on each face, the two main contenders being the rhombic dodecahedron and the tetrakis hexahedron (Archimedean duals, for those who know about these things). More paper constructions, proofs and a hardwood model of the rhombic dodecahedron appeared in the pavilion during the scarifying day on October 13.

There are also, of course, 18, 22 and 26 point versions of the game.....

Things to come

Every year the CA send out a list of CA events which clubs can bid to host. The new system has clubs bidding this year for events in 2003 and 2004. The information invariably arrives just after our committee meeting and the answers are typically required before the next meeting, so decisions sometimes have to be taken without a full discussion.

There are only a few events that we can realistically hope to stage - we were going to put in for the Peel Memorials, a handicap competition, in 2004, but this is now a four-day event and would place unrealistic demands on our already hard-pressed catering crew. I have therefore taken it upon myself to put in a bid for the Home Internationals in 2004, which take place over a single weekend in the middle of June. All we can do now is wait to see if our bid is successful.

We will be hosting the Selector's Weekend next year, and the Eastern Championships in 2003.

Groundsmanship

Perfect weather on Saturday 13 October saw a full day's work in which the lawns had the dew swept off with a tarpaulin dragged behind the mower, all six lawns scarified N-S, the leavings swept up with the leaf sweeper, the lawns mown and the autumn fertiliser applied. This followed an earlier diagonal scarification the week before. Many thanks to all who helped. Vertidrainage by contractors will take place on the 19th, and we will shred and spread the top dressing on the 27/28th - this is labour intensive, so please come and help if you possibly can.

Committee Meeting 6 September

- **Event catering:** As we do not organise formal catering for CA events and other matches staged at Wrest Park, there are occasions when players (and /or managers cast in the temporary role of caterers) visit the Silsoe village shop and buy up quantities of sandwiches. The shop have asked us if we could forewarn them so they can allow for extra demand.

This might seem ridiculous but does show up the gap in our provisions for these events. Wrest Park are hosting the Selector's Weekend next year. Is it not possible to cater for this and other events in the same way as for our own tournaments?

- **Beds & Herts League:** George Collin requested that all club members volunteer to play in the League at least once next year.
- **Gate lock:** Apparently the lock has been left open recently on a couple of occasions. There is nothing to suggest that any club member failed to rescramble the combination, but please remember to do so every time it is used. - **Resignations:** Charles and Grace Howell have written to resign from the club on the occasion of their moving to Scotland, thanking us for the welcoming social occasions and regretting that, due to Charles' hip operation, they were unable to play more often. We wish them well.
- **AOB:** The special extra item proposed for announcement at the 40th anniversary was agreed.
- **Next meeting:** No more meetings planned for this year, but if anyone has suggestions to make regarding any aspect of the club and its activities please let me know at any time - don't wait for the AGM. Things to think about: attracting and retaining new members, coaching and club events for beginners and higher handicappers, improvements to facilities, and so on.

While the recent 40th anniversary party gave us an opportunity to look back on the story so far, we should be considering what we need to do to secure the club's future for the next forty years and more.
