Handicap tournament May 21-23

Wrest Park looked its best, with the usual complement of pheasant, partridge, peacock and incontinent geese. Twenty five players assembled, but George Woolhouse had got there first, to set up his telescope on its tripod focused on the kestrels' nest, and to confuse everyone by making coffee in a teapot.

Play was in two blocks, and the main issue of day one was George Collin's hoops. All available referees were kept busy adjudicating shots stuck in hoops or just through but hampered. On subsequent days the situation seemed better – obviously all players had improved as a result of the experience.

latter case it was a close thing; Mark Homan, after three hours of missing everything, needing 15 hoops in the last quarter of an hour, hit in and started a break. He then proceeded round the court at a pace only matched by the resident hare frequently spotted around the park, but could only make up 13 points before time.

Sunday decided it when Nigel beat Gina and then Peter to emerge victorious. George Woolhouse had beaten both Gina and Nigel, but was obviously impaired by the coffee in other games. In Block A John Lonsdale was the winner with 7 wins, the same as John Bee, but having beaten him plus one on time. John Lonsdale only defeat was to John Norris, his only win. (There were actually some players in Block A not called John). Most importantly, everyone had enjoyed the event, and praised the organisation, catering, setting and weather.

Connoisseurs of trivia might like to record that this was the first Wrest Park home match played with Dawson balls. We were able to offer a choice of three makes and after checking that the hoops were wide enough gave the Dawsons their debut. More on balls later.

Men in form – tournament news

On the first weekend in May George Woolhouse won the Colchester Handicap tournament and Ben Ashwell won the Hunstanton Advanced tournament. The latter event is a regular date for a number of Wrest Park members, and Ben excelled himself by winning all his games and earning a handicap reduction to $-\frac{1}{2}$.

A load of balls

Over the years the club has invested in a number of different makes of croquet ball with the result that we now have a substantial collection. We will soon be replacing our tournament balls and felt it was time to dispose of some of our old stock, so it is an opportune moment to list what we have. Some disposals will have been made by the time you read this.

For a long time the only ball used for tournaments was the Jaques Eclipse. Jaques balls were made of compressed cork with a plastic skin, which gave them a certain elasticity and liveliness in play, but they are no longer made. They tended to be variable in size and were prone to cracking and going out of round. Other makes are solid plastic and retain their size and shape, but they have different playing characteristics and tend

to be less lively than a Jaques ball. The balls currently approved by the CA for tournaments are the Barlow GT, Dawson and Sunshiny (more on these later).

What makes have we got?

1. Walker. Of faintly translucent appearance with an unmistakable sound – a staccato crack. Good for rush strokes, but nothing else. They never caught on and we are disposing of the ones we have left.

2. Southport (or Birkdale). Distinguished by their wide milling, these are another make we tried, but they never gained universal acceptance so we were perhaps wise not to buy more. Our two sets (first colours) have been reprieved and are kept in the little hut in green racks. They are perfectly adequate for golf croquet and for use by the public at events such as the Craft Fair

3. Jaques. These come in several versions:

3.1 Eclipse - Slick, i.e. no milling. One set, to be disposed of.

3.2 Eclipse - Low grade. Several old sets, often with minor damage, marked with an L and used by SRI staff for lunchtime golf croquet and at public events. They are in the small hut, in black tubes.

3.3 Eclipse - Club balls. Old but reasonable quality for everyday use, kept in white racks in the locker in the pavilion. There are six sets of both first and second colours.

3.4 Eclipse - Tournament quality. The newest and best, although now showing their age. These are kept in boxes in the locker in the back hut and reserved for matches and tournaments. We have six sets of first and second colours plus some spares.

4. Barlow (from South Africa). There are two types:

4.1 Barlow C, distinguished by a C stamped in the centre of the milling. The first of the Barlow balls, they are a bit 'dead' and are hard work on a heavy lawn. We are disposing of our two sets.

4.2 Barlow GT. More lively than the Barlow C, but less so than Jaques, these are one of the standard balls for tournament play. They have a G stamped in the centre of the milling (it's not that obvious – check both sides) and are approved by the CA for all tournaments. We have four sets which are kept in the pavilion, in the third cupboard from the door, in grey tubes.

5. Dawson (from Australia). The Dawson 2000 is the new alternative to the Barlow GT, approved by the CA for major events and with a strong foothold at some clubs. The playing characteristics are said to be more akin to Jaques than those of the Barlow GT and they can be clearly identified by the Dawson 2000 stamp in the milling. We had one set each of first and second colours and have recently purchased three more sets of each. Two sets are in grey tubes in the same cupboard as the Barlows - the rest are still in their boxes but will be transferred to tubes when George has made up some more. Dawsons will be our tournament balls in the future and we will be investing in more sets.

At this point I must make the obvious point – please make sure you don't muddle up the Dawsons and the Barlow GTs in the tubes – check the maker's stamp.

I have not mentioned Sunshiny, the balls used at the MacRobertson Shield in Florida last year. The story behind them is far too complicated to go into here, but you will perhaps be relieved to know that we have not bought any and have no plans to do so.

Which balls should I use?

Golf croquet – use the Eclipse club balls (3.3)

Association croquet – for friendlies and most club competition games use the Eclipse club balls (3.3). You can use the Barlow GTs (4.2) or Dawsons (5) for club games if both players agree, but you are advised to check the hoop clearance before you play – if you are playing just after a tournament when the hoops have been set for the Jaques Eclipse tournament balls (3.4) you may find the hoops too narrow and the Barlows or Dawsons may actually stick in them. For team matches use the Eclipse tournament balls (3.4), Barlows or Dawsons according to taste.

We would encourage you to practise with the Barlows and Dawsons, as you will encounter them at other clubs and it will also improve your ability at running hoops.

Visiting groups and public events - use the Eclipse club balls (3.3), plus the Southport balls (2) and low grade Eclipse balls (3.2) if you need more.
