## WREST PARK WIN MARY ROSE

Lunch was enlivened by one of those moments when you have to hold your emotions in check for just a second – one of the plastic chairs split asunder dumping its mature male occupant on the floor. ## WREST PARK WIN EACF LEAGUE PLAYOFF

Having won the B&H league, we were invited to send a team to the East Anglian playoff at Hunstanton on 25th September. As this coincided with a Mary Rose match at Southport our choice was somewhat limited, but we managed to find four team players who were available, namely Tim Brewer, Geoff Strutt, Elaine Newman and myself. The format was a three-cornered match, with doubles in the morning and singles in the afternoon.

Tim and Geoff played Jeff Race and Cathy Storey from Hunstanton, Geoff quickly going round, but Tim struggling to find consistency. Eventually he played himself into form, and apart from an accidental peg-out of one ball at the end, they went on to win comfortably +19. Elaine and I played David Haslam and Margaret Selmes from Colchester. David got an opportunity and went round to penult, leaving Margaret on hoop 1. We managed to keep her there almost to the end as we went round in short breaks, with Elaine playing very steadily (including her characteristic long roll approaches, and peeling her partner's ball through 2-back), and me providing tactical guidance and intermittent errors. The other games had finished to get out of the rain, but we continued with spectators crowding the windows of the (splendid) pavilion, pegging out in just under three hours to win +14.

The rain stopped after lunch, but it was still cold. Tim was now in his usual form, and 26ed Colin Hemming of Colchester in short order. Geoff fought out a close game with Peter Bishop (also Colchester), but finally lost -3. Elaine and I were against the Hunstanton tactical substitutes (they changed their team to allow as many people as possible a game). Elaine used a lot of bisques early on against Bryan Siddington, but settled down and got to rover and rover with Bryan several hoops behind, but his experience got him home +4.

This left me in the last game still playing (again - I must enjoy having spectators) against John Christmas. When he was a few hoops ahead, and all my bisques had gone I thought I had little chance, but he started to miss his roquets, and I got home +3 on time. So we had

beaten each of the other clubs by two games to one, and emerged the winners. And the sun came out.

So congratulations to all concerned, not only on the day but throughout the season. We now have not only the opportunity to play other regional winners next season in the Secretary's Shield, but also the pleasure of organising next year's play-off.

## Groundwork

On 9/10 October, in absolutely perfect conditions, all the lawns were scarified diagonally and lawns 2, 4 and 6 were also scarified vertically, which produced a prodigious heap of dead material. The scarifying of lawns 1, 3 and 5 was completed a week later, and the autumn fertiliser has been applied. We now have to either hollow or solid tine and top dress the lawns. We also plan to do some refurbishment of the pavilion (as a minimum, clear out the furniture and then sand and revarnish the floor).

All these operations require a certain amount of manual labour, and we will be calling for volunteers when the time comes. Please come along if you can.
