## Peter Newman

Peter died peacefully on the ninth of January. He will be greatly missed by us all.

Peter and Elaine joined Wrest Park croquet club in 1997 after attending an open day. Peter wasted no time, winning a pro-am golf croquet competition a few months later. The following year he and Elaine began their long association with the Beds & Herts League team, and Peter also played in the Longman Cup, winning the deciding singles in the match against Ipswich. In 1999 he won the high bisquer's De Grey plate, and in 2000 had an *annus mirabilis* when he won the club handicap, retained the De Grey plate and was runner-up in the All England qualifier.

It didn't stop there. In 2001 he won a block in the May handicap tournament and in 2002 started a club league for high bisquers. In 2003 he qualified as a CA coach, ran the first of several club coaching courses, and still found time to win the All England qualifier and get through to the national final.

2004 saw him playing advanced doubles at the first staging of the Anderson trophy, doing more coaching and managing the Beds & Herts League team to such good effect that they won the League and the playoff to gain entry to the Secretary's Shield. Peter also won the club handicap for the second time.

In 2005 he played in four of the five Beds & Herts League matches, all of which were won, and he again won the All England qualifier. Last season he continued to play in the B&H League and also played two games in the September tournament, in the last of which he comfortably defeated the manager by a large margin. During the season he and Elaine made regular visits to

the Crake Valley club in Cumbria and played games in their Centenary Shield competition, which Peter won.

Peter took an active role at Wrest Park almost from the start. He joined the committee as the high bisquer's representative in 1999 and stayed for six years. Peter had a real love for the game; he and Elaine were often to be found playing and practising together, and they were regular spectators whenever the club staged a major event.

## Club tournaments

- The golf croquet singles and doubles one-day tournaments are open to everyone
- The open golf croquet event will be played to handicap rules, so anyone entering will need to establish a handicap. You can do this yourself by following the instructions in the Golf Croquet section on the CA website
- The Pro Am alternate stroke doubles tournament (Association croquet) will follow as far as possible the format described in the Tournament Management section of the Oxford Croquet website (see link on the CA site). Players of handicap 10 or above are paired with players of lower handicap in a series of 1½ hour games in which the strokes of each turn are played alternately by the two players. The pairings change for each round.

You can enter for these events on your subscription form. Entries for the golf croquet singles and doubles and the Pro Am will be posted on the noticeboard and can be added to until a week before the event.

## On the carpet – the EACF Indoor Golf croquet doubles

Wrest Park entered two teams for this event, held on 25<sup>th</sup> November at Soham. None of the players had ever played indoors before. There were eight other teams: three from Leighton-Linslade, two from Newport and Downham Market and one from Bury St Edmunds. The teams were split into two groups; each team played all the others in the group and the two group winners met in the final. There were four points for a win and two for a draw, with a bonus of three points if seven hoops were made before time was called.

Margaret Marshall and Ronnie Richardson, playing as Wrest Park II, beat Leighton-Linslade III 5-2 and Downham Market II 3-2 but lost to Leighton II and Newport II to finish third in the group, which was won by Newport II. Wrest Park I, represented by Peggy Kenny and Don Barrett, beat Bury St Edmunds 5-4 and Downham Market I 7-1, losing to Leighton I and Newport I. The three-point bonus (the only one of the day) put them top of the group and into the final, which they sadly lost 2-4.

The records show that the winners were Eddie Bell (handicap 2 or below, runner-up David Openshaw) and Harry Green (2½ or above, runner-up Tony Dumont). Harry made all the trophies.

David Openshaw won the most improved player award in 1977 and went on to become the England and GB captain in several successful MacRobertson Shield campaigns. He is currently President of the World Croquet Federation.

After an initial short visit in November, a black swan has returned and is currently keeping company with a pair of mute swans. Quite how this situation might develop is really anyone's guess (the sex of the swan is unknown). I therefore contacted the RSPB, who replied as follows:

*I suspect the mute swans are relatively young and have not yet bred and the black swan is only tolerated because the mute swans have yet to develop a strong sense of territory. Mute swans rarely breed before four to five years of age and although the pair bonds form before this age, the birds are unlikely to be strongly territorial until they breed.*

Curiouser and curiouser. I thought our swans were already a breeding pair. After all, we are quite used to seeing cygnets on the lake. Perhaps this pair is a different pair. If so, what has happened to the breeding pair? Keen birdwatchers are encouraged to observe and make notes, although establishing the age of the swans may prove beyond the scope of the amateur (apparently you have to measure an organ called the bursa of Fabricius, an operation which would be intrusive and, given its location, indelicate).

## News from English Heritage

We are still negotiating the terms of the Licence and are trying to sort out two main points. The first is the Licence Fee itself, which covers the amount the club pays EH and how it is calculated, and also what entitlements payment of the fee confers on members of the club. The second is dates and times of access, which covers when we can use the lawns and notification of dates of tournaments and matches to EH. We have made various suggestions and are awaiting a reply.

In the absence of any further information I would suggest that members carry on as normal, signing in if arriving between 8 and 5 on weekdays and 10 and 5 on weekends when the park is open to the public. Carry your membership card at all times as you may be refused entry without it, and remember to lock all gates after use.

## Croquet Management

I have ordered a copy of the CA book on tournament management for the club as part of our reference library. It should prove useful background reading for any members who want to become more involved with the management of our existing tournaments, and it may act as a stimulus to anyone who is interested in organising a new event.
