Advanced tournament 2-3 July

The 18 players were divided into three blocks in handicap order. Although most games were within the block, circumstances led to more mingling as the tournament progressed.

In the top block five of the six were minus players, including Ian Lines, Lionel Tibble and Debbie Cornelius. Ian won the block with four wins out of five including two TPs against Rod Ashwell and Richard Smith, losing only to Debbie. Richard Smith also had four wins, ahead of Lionel and Debbie with three.

The second block had a spread of 1 to 2½, with James Skelton infiltrating a Wrest Park/Letchworth club. It was evenly contested, with Eric Audsley, George Collin and Nick Mounfield all picking up three wins from five. Ian Mantle might have joined them but his game against George Woolhouse has no score recorded, instead an A is inscribed (Abandoned?) against it. As Nick beat both Eric and George it must be assumed he won.

The third block had handicaps ranging from 2½ (Philip Windred) to 7 (Geoff Strutt), and was won by Philip who squeezed in six games, winning four of them, ahead of Mike Hills with three from five and Geoff, John Bee and Gordon Weir with two apiece.

Advanced tournament 6-7 August

This tournament was the first to be held since the re-opening of Wrest Park following the completion of the first stages of the garden restoration and the opening of the new visitor centre. There had been plentiful publicity on TV and in the press, and the crowds flocked in. Players sitting near the noticeboard found themselves answering the usual questions ("Is he practising?"), explaining the rules and handing out leaflets.

The 18 players were made up of quartets from Wrest Park, Letchworth and Parsons Green and a mixture of old friends and new faces. After two rounds without

dropping a point, with a TP against Christian Carter, Robert Wilkinson looked like the man in form, but at this stage Nick Mounfield, Nick Parish and Rob Minshall were also undefeated. After two further rounds Robert and Rob both had four wins, and Robert finally got his hands on the prize by beating Rob +4. Rob also received a prize for the best performance by a higher handicapper. Several players stayed on for a last round. Robert was playing George Collin, who embarked on a triple and required a straight double peel to finish. This is what happened next:

Double banking was applied on one occasion, for less than one game, to facilitate the mowing of lawns 3 and 4 on Saturday evening.

The winner of the ladder was Geoff Johnson who won 5 out of 5 games with all of his opponents making at least 2 hoops. George Woolhouse was runner up in the knock-out and took the prize for the supplementary event.

It is well appointed and impressively secure, and a good example of the sort of thing we might consider for the future.

The lawns have a fall from north to south of about four feet and took a little getting used to. In the morning singles Mark was the first to finish, but John then beat Dennis and we watched the conclusion of the doubles. George resumed his peeling and managed two, getting into a tangle after the rover peel, but he and Bryan extricated themselves to get home +5.

After a splendid lunch George found himself on the receiving end as James completed a triple. Terry beat Dennis, but Bryan then lost to Jerry so it was down to the last game. John had got one ball round, but Mark repeatedly hit in when he had set up for the first hoop. Both players made stuttering progress and nerves began to show as short shots were missed. Mark was in play with one ball on rover against peg and penult when John took a natural break, returning to find that Mark had failed 2-back, and this opportunity was duly grasped to give us the game and the match. Terry then drove us back in air-conditioned comfort as the sun set.

Monday showed a slight improvement, but we only raised £62 in total. Given that six members put in about 40 hours between them this represents a return of £1.55 per hour.


