Taking our leave

Well, we made it, only a few days after the official deadline and after the coldest March for many years. It took three skips, various tractors, trailers and other machinery and the invaluable help of Ben and the contractors. To summarise the final stages:

Wednesday 20 March: Three men and a dog, with JCB and trailer, came to dismantle and take away the pavilion. The solid construction soon became apparent (remember that the A in NIAE stood for Agricultural).

They managed it with some assistance (and without breaking any of the windows), but there was plenty of rubbish left, not to mention the seven concrete beams that were revealed once the floor was taken up. More bits and pieces were taken to the new site.

Thursday 21 March: All the rubbish was arranged into tidy piles and the area was taped off, as it wasn't going to be possible to clear the site before the weekend. One of the beams was dug out to establish what we might be up against.

Monday 25 March: Two 4yd skips arrived and were filled with the remains of the roof and other rubbish, including the cupboard units.

Wednesday 27 March: Ben and one of the other contractors came and broke up the beams and added them to the skips. They also demolished the groundsman's hut and took it away to the dumping ground beyond the new lawns intending to burn it, and arranged to borrow the farmer's vehicle to move the changing room later that afternoon. Final transfer of items to the new site.

EH then vetoed the plan for burning the shed (creosote fumes), and the farmer pointed out that the forks on his vehicle weren't long enough. Oh dear.

Thursday 28 March: The two full skips were removed and a third delivered to the new site for the remains of the groundsman's hut. Plans were put in place to order straps to lift the changing room, either with the farmer's vehicle or with the JCB used to take away the pavilion.

Tuesday 2 April: Ben returned with the farmer and managed to shift the changing room without the need for extra straps. All the remaining paving slabs were loaded onto pallets and moved to the new site. The old site was later rotavated and seeded (see next page).

Lawns slightly smaller than full-size (using a six rather than a seven yard grid) were marked out and hoops and pegs inserted. At least a dozen members turned up and braved the chill wind to play GC and AC before retiring

to the pavilion for lunch. Several returned to the lawns for more play, but not long afterwards the rain arrived.

More was removed the following day, including two vintage folding stretchers. Jon Horsler, chairman of Silsoe Park Rangers FC, commented that it was something like 27 years since the pavilion had had such a clearout.
